(Upper Novice and beyond)

A repertoire workshop for solo or duet playing. “Rosie’s Last Waltz” is a song about an elderly woman who continues to dance long after her legs can no longer carry her. Learn two different parts for the song.

Joe Collins fell in love with the mountain dulcimer back in 1978, when he borrowed one to try and did not return it for three years!

After competing in a number of competitions and winning several regional competitions over a ten-year period, he won the National Mountain Dulcimer Championship in 2007 in Winfield, KS. Over the past twenty-five years, he has had the opportunity to teach and play in festivals from California to the east coast, from Florida to Vermont, and a lot of places in between.

Joe combines mountain dulcimer wizardry with good, solid vocals. He is a songwriter and vocalist, inspired by artists like Simon & Garfunkle, Gordon Lightfoot, Bob Dylan, and Kris Kristofferson. But as he grows older and pudgier, he realizes that perhaps the most profound influence on his musical bent was the old Burle Ives records he listened to over and over again as a kid.
